# Quelques paroles de Monsieur le Cure

Is complaining helpful?

Sometimes complaining is helpful, sometimes not.

Complaining can be helpful when it is directed toward someone who is able to respond to the situation, done in a constructive and positive manner, and at the appropriate time.

Complaining at an inappropriate time to someone who can do nothing about the situation is not helpful. Complaints uttered disrespectfully and negatively are odious. Timing is significant.

As a people of faith, moreover, we should reflect carefully before unloosening our tongues to spew forth our displeasure.

Although I have been thinking about this for a few weeks, I was reluctant to address the issue because my comments may have been dismissed as idiosyncratic. On the very morning that I had decided not to write about complaining, this sermon from St. Augustine was part of the Office of Readings:

Whenever we suffer some affliction, we should regard it as a punishment and a correction. Our holy Scriptures themselves do not promise us peace, security, and rest. On the contrary, the Gospel makes no secret of the troubles and temptations that await us, but it also says that he who perseveres to the end will be saved.

(Sermon of St. Augustine, <u>Liturgy of the Hours</u>, vol. IV, Wednesday of the Twentieth Week in Ordinary Time)

We, however, acting from our self-centeredness, our false self, think that we have a right to have things our way, to come very close to a commercial slogan. When this selfcreated right is violated, we take umbrage and express our complaints, summoning all of our self-righteous indignation.

Does any good come from this? Does this benefit self, others, or God? Does it not rather contribute to the demise of the person, the destruction of community?

If we were to respond to the same situation in accord with our true self, we would see an opportunity to grow in virtue, in imitation of the Lord Jesus. Is there anyone who does not deserve some punishment for past or present offenses? Is there someone who does not need to be corrected?

Our participation in the Mass brings us into contact with the Mystery of the Death and Resurrection of the Lord. Part of that contact means that we unite our suffering with His. If we will not make the effort to embrace the minor inconveniences as part of that suffering, how can we ever think that we will be able to unite the significant suffering that will eventually be a part of our lives? Is not the adage practice makes perfect?

Embrace the inconveniences, control the tongue, and seize the opportunity, the grace of the moment.

If we do, we make our community a more Christian environment.
